The 39th annual Oyster Bay Property Owner Association meeting is scheduled for 1pm on Saturday, October 25th at the Rodeway Inn located at 6273 Maddox Blvd, and you're invited. In preparation for this meeting, the Board of Directors will meet at 1pm on Saturday, September 20th also at the Rodeway Inn. This meeting will be used to review committee status, determine the POA and Water and Sewage Company budget requirements and fee schedules for 2015. These meetings provide everyone with opportunities to meet and talk with the Board of Directors and your neighbors and to voice community ideas and concerns.

A History Lesson Part 3 ...

The Oyster Bay development on Chincoteague is primarily made up of two sections. This series of articles written by Buford T. Rowland provides a history of the development of the Oyster Bay II Community and the evolution of the Property Owners Association.

In the late 1980s the Health Department would not permit expansion of the central sewer system as originally anticipated to allow additional connections to the central sewer system. With the exception of 5 seasonal, conditional (summer use) permits for traditional septic systems issued in 1995, the Health Department denied all applications for on-site disposal using traditional septic systems or newer technology systems, including approaches being permitted in Oyster Bay I at that time. The rationale was cited as being that Oyster Bay II was built over filled marshland which would prevent septic system effluent from dispersing properly from drain fields. As of 2005, 25 of the 95 lots in the Community had year-around homes with sewage disposal services (septic or central) while 5 additional lots had seasonal, conditional septic permits, leaving 65 lots with no known form of acceptable on-site sewage disposal. 4 of the 5 seasonal, conditional permitted lots had septic systems installed although none of the 4 had homes built.

In 2005, there being no other apparent means of sewer disposal available for new homes, the Property Owners

Association Board of Directors agreed to pursue the building of a new central sewer system for Oyster Bay II. Waste Water Management, Inc. of Falls Church, VA was selected as the engineering firm to develop an approach and cost estimates for the new central sewer system which would serve all lots in Oyster Bay II. At the October 2005 annual Property Owners Association general meeting, the membership voted to pursue the new central sewer system. Throughout 2006 and 2007 a central sewage system design was developed and revised through meetings with the Chincoteague city council and through sewage discharge and operating system permit applications and discussions with the Virginia Department of Health. The process continued through early 2008 at which time some new questions remained to be addressed with the Department of Health.

In 2008 the Virginia State Department of Health downsized and restructured their organization which resulted in requirements being changed in July 2008 to performancebased specifications with state and county inspectors not reviewing the details of each individual sewer system application. If a licensed professional engineer designed an on-site system and certified that it met all performancebased requirements, the county Department of Health would approve the application. This permitted several newtechnology systems to be designed and installed which met the performance-based Department of Health requirements. New individual lot on-site permits immediately began to be approved for Oyster Bay II. Since new homes once again could be built in Oyster Bay II using engineered on-site sewer systems, the Board of Directors voted to no longer pursue a new central sewer system for Oyster Bay II.

Since 2008, as of this date 21 new septic systems have been approved and installed and 14 new homes built. New on-site sewer systems continue to be approved although sewer system requirements continue to be more restrictive as new state regulations are enacted.

Gardening Goodies ...

Weeds can drive all of us crazy! They grow fast and can easily take over gardens and also ruin the look of many driveways and walkways. Some commercial weed killers are very potent and do eliminate the weeds but they pose additional risks to the environment and they're expensive. The following provides a much less expensive and very effective alternative. In your sprayer container, combine:

1 gallon Vinegar

2 cups Epsom Salt

1/4 cup Dawn Dish Soap (the blue original)

This mixture will kill anything you spray it on. Note, spray when it's dry outside and this includes waiting until the morning dew has evaporated. After spraying, wait several hours before checking out the results.

Who's In The Community?

There are rats in the OBII community! Don't panic, just keep reading. There are Muskrats in and around the neighborhood ponds. Muskrats are large rodents that always live near water. They have thick brown fur and a long, furless, scaly tail. They can grow up to two feet long (with tail). Their rear feet are webbed for swimming, and their eyes and ears are very small.

Muskrats live in marshes, or alongside ponds, lakes, rivers, and streams. You can see them swimming across Mallard Pond on a regular basis. They build a "lodge" out of reeds or may create a burrow in the pond bank.

Muskrats are active during the day but most active at night. They eat a wide variety of vegetable and animal foods, including: cattails, sedges, rushes, pondweeds, switch grass, mussels, crayfish, frogs, snails, and fish.

Muskrats breed between late winter and September. A female may have up to five litters each year. Muskrats are territorial. But, if it gets too crowded, the mom will drive away the offspring.



We also have River Otter in Mallard Pond. From a distance, the muskrat and otter look similar. But you can usually identify the otter by its larger flat tail. The river otter is a large, brown, weasel-like mammal found along the shores of the Chesapeake Bay and lakes, streams, rivers and marshes throughout the Bay watershed.

The otter lives in a den built on the edge of the pond with an underwater entrance, similar to or stolen from a muskrat. Otters are carnivorous and feed mostly on fish but will also eat frogs, crabs, crayfish, and small mammals such as young muskrats. Otter breed in late winter to spring and usually have one litter.

A similar species to the muskrat is the Nutria. The nutria is also a rodent that can live in ponds and marshes. Nutria feed on marsh plant. They have been known to wipe out marsh area and the habitat and food provided for many other species on animals. For this reason, they are considered an unwelcome species. There have been no reports of nutria in the OBII community or Chincoteague at this point. They are prevalent in Dorchester County Maryland and spreading.

If you see something swimming across the pond, take a good look to see if it is a muskrat or an otter. If you're lucky, maybe you will spot an otter playing on the bank of the pond or doing a little back stroke just to show off.
