Updates From The Board ...

As a follow up to last month's newsletter, you've probably seen that there's been activity on the parcel of land adjoining Oyster Bay II by N. Hibiscus Dr. at the community entrance. This land is called "Parcel E" as it was known on the original land plats. Currently, there's a disagreement between the OB II POA and the owner of Parcel E regarding access to Parcel E using OB II roads. Since some contractors have been using OB II roads for access, a temporary fence has been installed to get the point across that there's no agreement in place granting access. Representatives from OB II's Board of Directors plan to meet with the Chincoteague Town Council on Monday, 8/3 to review the Council's assumption of access when they approved a rezoning of Parcel E. Please note, the OB II Board may also have to resort to legal action if access rights are not otherwise determined.

An important reminder: Please be a responsible property owner and a good neighbor and check your Pine Trees for any signs of Southern Pine Beetle activity. All infected trees should be <u>cut and removed</u> from the property as soon as possible to prevent the beetles from moving on to neighboring trees and to keep the infected trees from falling on your own house or someone else's!

Unleashing Hidden Talent ...

Many walk around Chincoteague to the shops and galleries on the Island and see beautiful hand crafted items and wish they could paint, draw or make some of those unique crafts themselves. The truth is, you can! I've heard many people say "I have no artistic talent." I love taking these people on and I offer them one class sessions on getting started in watercolor pencil painting as it's one of the easiest and lowest costs art projects you can begin with. And you can learn the basics in less than two hours.

You can buy a beginner's set of watercolor pencils from Michael's, the arts and crafts store, either online at www.michaels.com or at one of their retail locations in Salisbury or Ocean City. Watercolor pencils are not the same as colored pencils. The color in watercolor pencils melts and blends on the paper when a brush with water is applied. Next you will need a set of plain colored pencils. Dollar Tree has these for \$1 (of course). Your last item is watercolor paper (make sure you don't buy sketch paper). Watercolor paper is available at WalMart and it costs less than \$6 for a tablet of 30 sheets.




Once you have your materials, follow these steps ...

- 1. Find a simple picture you'd like to paint (flower, bird, boat, beach scene, etc.).
- 2. Outline your picture with a very light pencil, Using tracing paper, copy your picture. Rub the outline lines on the back of the tracing paper with the side of the pencil, lay the pattern on top of the watercolor paper and retrace the picture.
- 3. Outline, using medium strength, the main lines of the picture with a darker colored pencil of the same color tone as the pictured item.
- 4. Look at the drawing and determine where the light would be coming from (top, left, right) and then using at least three or more color tones or values of the same color, color each of the items in the picture, using watercolor pencil and color in the petals, the leaves, the driftwood, the shell etc. Use a darker tone color for the side with the shadow and the lighter tones for the brighter side. Also, consider white or no color at all as one of the tones.

5. Next, using a small paint brush and only water, dip your brush in the water, wipe it lightly on a paper towel and brush just a little water onto the pictured item, section by section, lightly blending the colors from light to darkest, not darkest to light. Repeat this step on the leaves, blooms, stems, branches, feathers, boat hull, etc.

Your picture should come to life with excellence. See? You had hidden talent you never knew!

Most of us easily recognize the Bald Eagle, the symbol of the United States of America. Many of us see them soar overhead in the community or feeding at the wildlife refuge. And, it's always great to get a nice view of these majestic birds just hanging around on the light stanchions at the local school. The population was estimated to be upwards of 500,000 in the late 1800s. But, 40 years ago the population was threatened with extinction. Primarily due to hunting and poisoned food sources, the population had dropped to about 400 breeding pairs in the 1960s.



The Endangered Species Act of 1973 along with the banning of the pesticide DDT has lead to a resurgence to their population. By 1995, there were about 8,000 breeding pairs in the lower 48 states and their status changed from "endangered" to "threatened". In 2007,

with about 10,000 breeding pairs, the Bald Eagle was removed from the "threatened" list, though it remains protected under the Migratory Bird Treaty Act.

The recovery of the Bald Eagle is a great success story and we are fortunate to have several nesting pairs and their families in the area. In late winter to early summer, visit the Bateman Center at the Chincoteague NWR and enjoy the Eagle Cam, where you can watch as the eaglets hatch and the parents nurture them to fledglings.


