Remember Woody Woodpecker ...



This article focuses on the Downy Woodpecker. The active little Downy Woodpecker is a common bird species in the Oyster Bay II community. It can be seen at backyard feeders and in trees and woods in the community. It may be seen with flocks of other woodland birds such as chickadees and nuthatches barely out sizing them. An often acrobatic forager, this black-and-white woodpecker is at home on tiny branches or balancing on slender plant galls and suet feeders.

The typical Downy Woodpecker is about 6.5 inches in length with a wing span of 11 inches. They have a black and white face pattern, black wings with white spots, a white breast and back and a short sharp pointed bill. Like most bird species, the male has more color to attract the females. The male Downy Woodpecker can be identified by the bright red patch on the back of its head. The Hairy Woodpecker looks very similar to the Downy but is about a third size larger and has a much larger bill.

Downy Woodpeckers are generally year round residents. They nest and roost in tree cavities in the winter. The breeding pairs will create a nest in a dead tree or limb.

Downy Woodpeckers forage on trees, picking the bark surface in summer and digging deeper in winter. They mainly eat insects, also seeds and berries. In winter, especially, Downy Woodpeckers can often be found at backyard suet feeders.

FYI - There are seven species that may be seen in the community. From the Chincoteague NWR bird checklist, they are:

An * indicates that they breed in the area. The seasonal occurrences are indicated by:

- A abundant a species which is very numerous
- C common likely to be seen or heard in suitable habitat
- U uncommon present, but not certain to be seen
- O occasional seen only a few times during a season
- R rare may be present but not every year

Chincoteague History at Your Fingertips ...

You can learn a lot about Chincoteague's history and heritage through books, visiting the local museums and visitor centers or just talking to the locals. Certainly, the Chincoteague Island Library has its share of references to the Island's' past. But it also has a great resource that you can access right from your computer. The library website has a section called Oral History. This section contains interviews with locals (especially old timers) that provide interesting perspective of Chincoteague in the somewhat distant past and perspectives on what it has become over the years. The interviews are available in audio form mp3 format so that you can listen to them on your computer. Many also include transcripts of the interview if you prefer the written word.
