
Also, the Board is looking into the Southern Pine Beetle issue in OB II. If anyone has information that could be of assistance, please forward it to a member of the Board

What Ducks ...

There are three ducks that may be seen on Mallard Pond that have some commonality to their look, but are really quite different. They are the Hooded Merganser, Ruddy Duck and Bufflehead. They all have white patches on their faces. Well, at least the males do.



The Hooded Merganser is the largest of these three species at 18 inches. The male is easily recognizable with its large black head and white crest behind its eye. The male has a black back with brown underneath, white front with vertical black and white striping on either side. The females are a more nondescript gray-brown to reddish-brown and slightly smaller than the males. Hooded mergansers dive in fresh water to feed on small fish, crayfish and other crustaceans and aquatic insects. Hooded Mergansers are mostly seen around Chincoteague in the winter as they prefer the coastal areas this time of year. But you may see them occasionally in the summer as they breed as far south as Georgia and Louisiana.



The Ruddy Duck is about 15 inches long and has fairly drab color with a white patch below the eye in the cheek area. The males are indeed ruddy colored in their brilliant rusty-brown breeding plumage. Later in the winter, you may see the bright plumage coming through. The females are a drab gray and a discernible white stripe below the eye, not so much a patch. Both have a paint brush like tail. Ruddy ducks dive to feed on pondweeds, algae and other aquatic seeds and grasses. They also eat aquatic insects and their larvae, shellfish and crustaceans. Ruddy ducks breed primarily in the prairie region of North America and winter on the coasts. Seeing Ruddy ducks in Chincoteague in the winter is normal. Seeing one in the area out of season is not unheard of.



The Bufflehead is about 15 inches long. The male is distinctive black and white, black back and white below, with the white patch across the back of its head that extends from cheek to cheek. The female has a black back and drab gray underneath with an oval white patch extending below the eye to the nape of the neck. Bufflehead dive for aquatic invertebrates, crustaceans, and mollusks. They typically swallow their food while still underwater. Bufflehead breed in southern Canada and winter along the coasts of North America. They can be seen in most of the ponds and open water areas around Chincoteague this time of year.

If riding around the wildlife refuge or just out for a walk in the community, keep an eye out for these winter visitors.

All Around Town ...

As well as all around the Eastern Shore, there's still plenty to do during the month of January in the area. Our town may be a little quiet at this time of the year but north and south of Chincoteague on Route 13, there's art, theatre, music and nature events happening.
