Fall Migration ...

It's that time of the year again. Time for the fall migration of shorebirds. But fall migration in August and September? Has global warming messed things up that bad?

Well, it turns out that many shorebirds migrate north into the Canadian tundra in the May time frame. By the end of July, they have completed breeding and the immature birds have become independent. So it's time to head south for the winter. South, as in South America. There are several strategic stopping points along the flyway that afford birds food and habitat to rest while preparing for the next leg of their journey. The Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge typically proves an excellent place to spend a few weeks tanking up. So, if you've been noticing increased numbers of shorebirds on the beach, in the mud flats of Tom's Cove and on the wildlife loop, that's why.

What are shorebirds? They are small to medium size birds that fall under the scientific order Charadriiformes. In most parts of the world, these birds are referred to as waders. But in North America, we think of waders as the larger Egrets and Herons and use shorebird to describe these families. There are about 36 different species that might be seen in the area. Most would be classified as Sandpipers and Plovers. But, there are Willets, Dowitchers, Yellowlegs, Godwits and others.

Some shorebirds breed at the National Wildlife Refuge. One example is the endangered Piping Plover which requires keeping parts of the beach on Assateague closed every summer much to a lot of people's dismay. However, many birds just pass through on their travels north and south each year.

The challenge is in the identification of individual species. Some can be rather obvious, like a Ruddy Turnstone or a Black-necked Stilt. But some can be difficult to determine, especially if lighting isn't great and they are in groups of mixed species. Having other known birds to compare size and coloration can help in identification.

Seeing a single shorebird by itself might be difficult to discern the species without some detailed study. But having two similar species in sight (or in your bird guide) make it easier to identify one from the other.

What's Cooking ...

Did you know that tomatoes are great for your health? They are loaded with many, many benefits. For example, tomatoes are good for your skin and they help to maintain strong bones. They provide essential anti-oxidants and they're good for your heart, kidneys and eyes. So whether you've got them growing in your own garden or you're taking them from your generous neighbor's garden or stopping at your local farm stand, there's no better time of the year to enjoy fresh tomatoes. And here's an easy and delicious recipe that'll have you enjoying them even more.

Tomato Pie

- 1 cup Bisquick
- 1/4 cup water
- 1 tbsp butter
- 4-5 medium tomatoes, peeled and sliced 1/2 " thick
- 1 cup shredded cheddar cheese
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 2 tbsp parsley
- 1 − 2 chopped scallions



Directions: Mix Bisquick, water and butter together and press into a 9" pie pan. Arrange tomato slices on crust. Sprinkle cheddar cheese on top of the tomatoes. Mix mayonnaise, parsley and scallions together and smear mixture over cheese. Bake at 350° for approximately 40 minutes in lower half of the oven.

The Bird Extravaganza ...

Three weeks ago, there was quite a bit of bird activity on Mallard Pond over the weekend. There were hundreds of Egrets, Herons and Ibis. Specific species that were seen included: Great Egret, Snowy Egret, Great Blue Heron, Tri-Colored Heron, Little Blue Heron, Green Heron, Black Crowned Night Heron and White Ibis. This total lunar eclipse will be visible from most of North America, South America, Europe, west Asia and parts of Africa will be able to see the eclipse.



This eclipse will last for 3 hrs and 20 mins from beginning to end. The Moon will be totally eclipsed (totality) for about 1 hr and 12 mins.
